

# "CIRI" BREAKS CLASS B MILE RECORD

On May 16, over 2,000 fans watched the Jacket's flying tortilla, Ciriaco Martinez, run his last race in high school competition. "Ciri" broke the Class B State mile record of 4:36.7.

Ciriaco not only

took first in the mile run but also took a first in the 880 yard run. Ciriaco's time in the 880 yard run was 2:01.9, better than that of class A.

In the mile run "Ciri" won the race easily leaving the

second place winner many yards behind. "Ciri's" new record time was 4:32.9 bettering then old state record with about four seconds. The old record of 4:36.7 was held by Jack Tryon of Benson since 1937.

The track meet was part of the University Week program. Ciriaco scored 10 points to put Tombstone in fifth place.

Than "Good luck, good health and happiness".

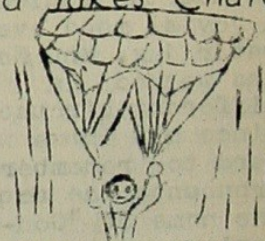
## CAFETERIA FEATURES GOOD MEAL

tel colors from the top of the pole to the walls forming a room of itself. The banquet tables were in the form of a horseshoe under the pole. The speakers sat at the head of it.
