WHAT INSURANCE COMPANIES THINK OF AIDS

We are fed a lot of statistics by the government regarding AIDS. We are told only about 200,000 in the U.S. have aids now.

The insurance companies have closed ranks on this subject and made a new policy. Of course many policies do not mention AIDS because it is a new disease, but -

Their new policies state communicable disease, including aids, is not a bodily injury caused by conditions at home. This knocks aids out of the homeowners' policy.

The reasons for this decision are many and varied but can't be discounted. The surgeon-general at one time said "Aids could only be passed on by sexual conduct, so wear condoms." This has been disproved, even if the surgeon general has never changed his findings verbally or in print.

Instead of 200,000 people in the U.S.A. having AIDS, it is now published that over 2,000,000 women, alone, have AIDS. Does that mean women are more homosexual than men or does it mean 200,000 people having aids is just a drop in the bucket?

Michael Lupo found out he was an AIDS carrier but showed no other symptoms. He got mad because nothing could be done for him, he was told, so he went out and spread the disease. When he was arrested, it was for four charges of murder and

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then he admitted to a string of 4,000 sexual encounters.

On the positive side, there is said to be a help against AIDS, which has been found but not proven as yet. It is a holistic medicine which takes care of body, mind and soul.

Biologists have expressed a fear that the entire ocean may also become a breeding ground for AIDS. They say the dolphins in the ocean are dying rapidly from a disease very similiary to AIDS. More than 200 dolphins have died in the last two months and have been washed ashore on the Atlantic seaboard. It might be pointed out that dolphins are bisexual

At first, contamination of the ocean was blamed for the deaths. U.S. Federal Investigator Joseph Geraci said the dolphins are still dying and nothing can be done to help them.

Dr. Stephen Langer, disagrees with the surgeon-general by saying condoms don't offer complete protection against disease. He offers two reasons for his report. (1) one out of every five batches of condoms examined failed to meet the minimum standard for leaks which means the germs get in and the sperm gets out.

Another examination showed that condoms allowed leakage of herpes, AIDS, and Hepatitis viruses and also syphli. His final diagnosis is that condoms are not designed to protect against sexually transmitted diseases.

This scare seemed to pull couples closer together and cut down on divorce and also homosexuality. But now a new thought is backfiring. The new closeness of couples is getting on their nerves because they are not used to so much togetherness. The monogamy idea is going out the window again and divorces are going out the window again.

An insurance salesman in Texas, who at the age of 38 and the father of two and divorced started making up with the sons of his low-income clients. One of the 16-year-old boys showed up with AIDS so he went over and shot the salesman dead. Now it is thought the salesman has infected at least 54 boys. This was determined by an entry in his computer which gave all the horrid details. Rev. Richard Hume, pastor of the 1st United Methodist church is very concerned about the effect this will have on the community.

One enterprising boss tried to take care of his employees by putting condoms in the paychecks of his workers, except for married employees. At first there were some made made and female employees but after the boss explained his concern over his employees and their health, they accepted and now think it is a good idea.

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**BICENTENNIAL OAK
PLANTED ON FORT**

An oak is a symbol of strength and endurance. It can live for hundreds of years, surviving storm, disease and pollution. A good example of such a tree is the nation's largest white oak, the Wye Oak in Maryland.

It was over 200 years old when the U.S. Constitution was signed.

Fort Huachuca workers planted an oak last month to honor the bicentennial of the signing of the Constitution. Mike Shaughnessey, garrison forester, chose a Southern live oak, a 15-year old tree that was raised and boxed in Tucson.

Although the Southern Live Oak is not native to this area and is most often seen at sea level, Shaughnessey felt that it would do well here. It can grow up to an altitude of about 5,500 feet and is suitable for the soil and moderate climate on post.

Shaughnessey said that several live oaks were planted in front

of City Hall in Sierra Vista about two years ago. They have stabilized, although they need more water and fertilizer than the native oaks, he said.

Shaughnessey did not choose one of the more common species of oak that grow on the post, such as the scrub, white, silver leaf or, most commonly, the Emery, because he said nurseries do not carry the native stock. Furthermore, a native oak of any size is very difficult to transplant because the root system is much larger than the crown, he said.

"An oak's height-to-crown spread is about 50 feet to 50 feet," he said, "but an oak's root system is normally many times the diameter of the crown spread in its reach for water."

Furthermore, the native oaks are multi-stemmed because of their tendency during the seeding stage to die back periodically, Shaughnessey said, regrowing from the root system.

**CLEANUP OF FIRE SITE
PROCEEDING SLOWLY**

Cleanup of the Fort Huachuca fire site is proceeding at a deliberately slow pace, according to Lt. Col. W. L. Manning, deputy garrison commander. The July 5 fire destroyed 21 World War II buildings with an estimated loss of over \$8 million.

He said the Army is on "hold mode" to insure proper execution of cleanup and disposal of asbestos-laden debris. The post is now holding conferences with 8 (a) contractors, he said, so that they may have a better understanding of the cleanup requirements in order to get a more realistic idea of the costs involved.

Removal of the debris will begin in about 60 days and will be done properly," Manning said.

In the meantime, the site has been covered with plastic, and the burned out boiler plant encased in plywood. The site is watered daily to prevent asbestos-laden dust from contamina-

Friday will see a business meeting from 1300 to 1630 hrs.

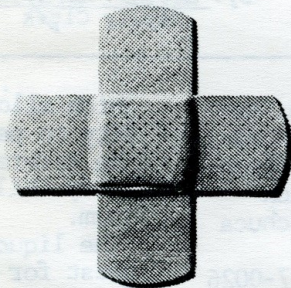
Saturday will be a big dinner/dance from 1800 to 0200 hrs. Sunday.

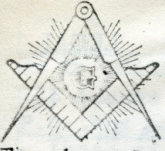

The town attorney, Mr. Gary Ramaeker was directed to look into Mrs. Searcy's allegations and report back to the council in two weeks time.

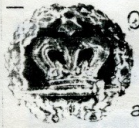
